On Sunday 8th November, two wreath bearers from our community will walk, one from Bromley and one from Station Road starting at 10.40. They will join together with the vicar at the War Memorial at 10.50. We invite everyone to come to their doors/the road to watch the wreath go by, and then to follow this Act of Remembrance from their doorway, or inside their homes.

This Act of Remembrance has been put together by the Church, so there are references to God and Jesus.

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We meet in the presence of God.

We commit ourselves to work in penitence and faith for reconciliation between the nations, that all people may, together, live in freedom, justice and peace.

We pray for all who in bereavement, disability and pain continue to suffer the consequences of fighting and terror.

We remember with thanksgiving and sorrow those whose lives, in world wars and conflicts past and present, have been given and taken away.
